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EECBG Summary

What: Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) allocated to states and communities through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)

Purpose: EECBG funds are an investment in infrastructure, designed to modernize and upgrade American infrastructure to enhance competitiveness, drive the creation of good-paying jobs, tackle the climate crisis, and ensure stronger access to economic, environmental, and other benefits for disadvantaged communities.

Who: Georgia Environmental Finance Authority (GEFA)- Lead Distributor

- Funding has been provided directly to select communities by the Dept of Energy (DOE).
- <u>GEFA funding will focus on providing grants to communities who did not receive direct funding.</u>
- J40 requirement with 40% of funding allocated to disadvantaged communities.

State Allocation: \$2,989,230



EECBG Summary

Generic Federal Requirement Overviews:

- Build America, Buy America Act (BABA)

Federal funding to use American made products

- Davis Bacon Wage Act (DBA)

All contractors are paid prevailing wages for geographic location

- National Environmental protection Act (NEPA) on a case by case basis

Consideration of environmental impacts

- Historic Preservation

Buildings over 50 years old and in historical districts

- Reporting: Quarterly, Annually etc.

By choosing to pursue a Blueprint, some requirements might not apply. Technical Assistance can assist with identifying metrics and reporting based on Blueprint.



EECBG Program Design

Grant Amount: \$150,000, There is no cost match required.

Design: Communities eligible to apply, will select a Blueprint of interest and pursue an eligible activity, or "key activity " listed under the Blueprint.

Blueprints: Blueprints are DOE model projects and programs designed to help local and tribal governments achieve high impact results with limited grant dollars. Blueprint options include:

- 1. Energy Planning
- 2. Energy Efficiency- Energy Audits and Building Upgrades
- 3. Energy Savings Performance Contracts: Energy Efficiency and Electrification in Government Buildings
- 4. Community Solar
- 5. Solarize Campaign
- 6. Electric Vehicles and Fleet Electrification
- 7. Workforce Development



EECBG Program Design

GEFA has divided the funding into two sources- "Prioritized" and "General State"

- Mapping was done in partnership with Southeast Energy Alliance (SEEA)
- Prioritized communities have been identified based on a variety of factors/metrics, including energy burden, sociodemographic and workforce indicators. These communities also fall within the J40 census tract.
- Competitive application process for both groups.
 - Application is open and will close March 15th, 2024
 - Application link and application templates are available on the GEFA website and QuickBase Homepage
 - Application edits can not be saved when working in the QuickBase system. Please review the sample application PDF prior to editing the application in QuickBase.

Technical Assistance: GEFA has partnered with nonprofit, **Southface**. Southface will provide **free** TA to those interested in applying, application and program design assistance, Blueprint support, along with a menu of other services.

Blueprint Key Activities

Blueprint #1. Energy Planning

- Stakeholder Engagement- setting up supporting staff, possibly consultants or project managers
- Energy data collection and baseline establishment
- Developing energy goals, writing, adopting and publicizing plans

Blueprint #2A. Energy Efficiency- Energy Audits and Building Upgrades

- Building Energy Assessment- gathering data and building benchmarking
- Energy audits- hiring energy auditor
- Building upgrades- With the information provided by the audit, determining whether a building is a candidate for rehab, onsite renewables, resilience projects, electrification and grid-interactivity

Blueprint #2B. Energy Savings Performance Contracts: Energy Efficiency and Electrification in Government Buildings

- Exploring potential financing options
- Procurement of ESPC and legal support- Soliciting and selection of a Qualified Energy Service Company (ESCO)
- Project implementation, post implementation measurements and verification



Blueprint Key Activities

Blueprint #3B. Community Solar

- Stakeholder Engagement, education and outreach- engagement with utilities, confirm regulatory allowance
- Site assessment and selection
- Procurement of developer, legal and technical support- government can assist with RFP process to select qualified solar developer(s)
- Installation of solar panels- rooftop or ground mounted

Blueprint #3C. Solarize Campaign

- Designing solarize campaign details
- Stakeholder engagement through education and outreach
- Procurement of solar installer/ developer, legal and technical support through RFP process
- Solarize program education, outreach and advertising



Blueprint Key Activities

Blueprint #4A. Electric Vehicles and Fleet Electrification

- Development of fleet replacement plan, including stakeholder engagement and input- fleet assessment, technician training
- Site planning and preliminary assessment- identify charging locations, evaluate charging options, siting cost estimates
- Develop utility data sharing agreement
- Develop charging plan, including cost assessment of electric bills
- Procurement, legal and technical support to purchase EVs- vehicle cost estimate, identifying fleet needs, budget assessment, zoning, compliance, permitting, etc.
- Installation of charging infrastructure

Blueprint #6. Workforce Development

- Workforce needs assessment- labor force gap assessment
- Program design and curriculum development- transition skills training
- Stakeholder engagement- convening clean energy employers, training provided, educational systems, etc. matching trainees with jobs
- Paying trainers and trainees- including wraparound services

FAQ Review- Eligibility

- 1. Eligibility: Local government, a unit of government/public authority recognized within a state under the constitution. This includes: <u>Cities, counties, municipalities, towns, school</u> <u>districts, public authorities- development authority.</u>
- 2. If you are not a "Priority Community" can you still apply for the funding? Yes! There will be a number of awards for the "priority" communities and a number of awards for the "general" communities.
- 3. Blueprint 2A: Energy Efficiency- Energy Audits and Building Upgrades Eligibility: Energy Audits and/ or building upgrades can be made to government buildings or commercial buildings. <u>Commercial buildings are limited to schools, libraries, correctional</u> <u>institutions, and community centers</u>



FAQ Review-Funding

- **4. Grants sizes:** Communities can apply for up to a \$150,000 grant, there is no minimum amount and there is no community cost match required. The funding can not be used for reimbursement of a previous project.
- 5. How will we receive the funds? Funds we be in the form of reimbursement, however, a recipient does not need to provide upfront payments, recipients can bill upon receipt of an invoice, GEFA can then pay the recipient and then recipient can pay the vendor.
- 6. Can you fund multiple projects with the grant? Yes, you can pursue multiple key activities under the Blueprint. You can also fund multiple Blueprint project, if funding remains (you will need to provide reporting/metrics for both projects). Applying for multiple projects does not give you an advantage in the application process.
- 7. Can we use outside funding on a project? Yes, if your community has money to put towards the grants that is allowable, if it is a separate federal funding source please delineate what each federal source will fund. ex.) If retrofitting a building and have two federal sources, have one source pay for the energy audit and the other pays for the retrofit measures.



FAQ Review-Application

- 8. What is a UEI? The Federal government uses a unique identifier to track entities applying for grants and cooperative agreements. On April 4, 2022, the unique identifier used across the federal government changed from the nine-digit Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) to the 12-character alphanumeric Unique Entity ID (UEI). All applicants must register with SAM.gov and receive a UEI.
- 9. Where can I find detailed explanations of Blueprints and Key Activities? GEFA has provided an <u>application guidance document</u>, discussing application details and extensive blueprint details, including key activities. Posted on GEFA's website.
- **10.** How long will the application take to fill out? The application for "priority" communities is 4 narrative questions and for "general communities" it is 5 narrative questions. The application should take around 1-2 hours to fill out. We encourage a paragraph response to each question.
